Many of these concerns centered on three tracts of land whose future is currently in flux.

> Near the northern end, the trail traverses the prior Temple Mountain Ski Area. This area, which includes many acres beyond the old ski area, was purchased a couple of years ago by a local couple much dedicated to conservation. They are currently talking with the State of New Hampshire with an

section of the trail, more than a mile of the trail crosses lands of the Hampshire Country School, who are actively seeking ways to place conservation easements on the school's 1,400 acre Wapack Wilderness, which will protect approximately one mile of the trail and the wonderful vistas in the area. The property in-

cludes Pratt Mountain and Stony Top.

Further south on the trail near Binney Pond, the trail crosses lands on which the owners have proposed an extensive development, but they have recognized the value of the Wapack Trail and have had discussions with the Friends. These discussions may lead to the relocation of a section of the trail so that it does not cross the

middle of their proposed development, but rather to one side, which could then be placed in permanent trail easement. The Trail Master and other members have scouted this proposed relocation, and feel that it would be an improvement, providing better ground conditions and better views.

The future for the preservation of the trail

looks bright. However, even if all these events took place, there are still areas where the trail crosses private property, and it become increasingly important that we "step lightly." Your help in maintaining the trail by careful stewardship is essential. Have a great summer, and we look forward to seeing you on the Wapack. - Mitch Call, President

# Friends of the Wapack Trail Workdays

For 2006 we have a number of interesting work-days scheduled. The workdays play a key part in making the Wapack Trail what it is. They are designed to supplement the work of the trail captains and to accomplish tasks beyond that what is expected of the trail captains. For those of you who may not have the time to volunteer to be a trail captain, they provide an opportunity to give something back to the trail. I urge you to show up for at least one of the workdays and see how much fun it is. You'll probably get dirty and sweaty, but I can assure you that you'll feel a sense of accomplishment at the end of the day.

All workdays are on Saturday and start at 8:30 AM and typically wind down around 3:00 or 4:00 in the afternoon. Brink lunch, water, work clothes, and enthusiasm. We supply the tools and encouragement.

Saturday April 29: Raymond Trail, East Mountain Road, Peterborough, NH. We'll be doing general trail maintenance including cleaning water bars, clearing brush, and repainting blazes. De-

pending on its condition this may include replacing a small bridge. Meet at the trailhead on East Mountain Road.

Saturday September 23: Mount Watatic, Route 119, Ashburnham, MA. We'll be having a joint workday with the Mid-State Trail group covering the section of the Wapack that the Mid-State Trail is coincident with as well as the various side-trails. This will include basic trail maintenance with emphasis on better defining the trail on Watatic. Meet at the parking lot on Route 119 in Ashburnham.

Saturday October 28: Pratt Mountain. This workday will concentrate on the section of trail from the spring at the north end of Binney Pond and the summit of Pratt Mountain. This is one of the steepest sections of the trail and as the forest under story has thinned, the trail has become more difficult to follow. We will be attempting to better delineate the trail and do general trail maintenance.




