Wapack Trail Founders: Marion (Buck) Davis and Frank Robbins

We are in the autumn of an especially important year in the history of the Wapack Trail. Ninetyone years ago Allen Chamberlain, the author of the "Annals of the Grand Monadnock" and Albert Annett, popular local sportsman, convinced Frank Robbins and Marion Buck to blaze and clear-cut the entire 23 miles of the Wapack Trail. They did this using only hand tools, working on Sundays when other duties were less pressing. Marion coined the name "Wapack" by joining meals to hikers until it closed in the "Wa" from Mount Watatic, our southern terminus, and "Pack" from North Pack Monadnock, our north-

ern terminus. The trail opened in 1923, preceded by a feature article in the Boston Evening Transcript of November 4, 1922 boasting that the trail would "become a popular route. not alone because of its attractiveness, but its accessibility to population centers." It was proven right, and Marion and Frank went on to build the Wapack Lodge. Initially it accommodated up to twenty-five overnight guests. A second story was added and Marion continued to serve 1959. Amongst its many guests was Benton MacKaye, who hiked the

From the President

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
Wapack before planning the Appalachian Trail, which was completed in 1937. The Wapack Lodge was destroyed by a fire on July 29, 1993.

Now ninety years later, the Wapack Trail is considered the oldest intra-state hiking trail in New England, and draws its advocates from all over the northeast. We celebrated its 90th birthday by sponsoring a series of exploration hikes, engaging guides familiar with the local area who talked of trail and local history, and special features on and around the trail. We are now looking forward to the 100th Anniversary.

I have learned as one ages that history becomes more interesting, often coupled with the ponderings of what the future might bring. And I strongly believe that the Wapack Trail will continue to be a source of serenity and beauty for many years to come.

In looking back over some old Board of Directors meetings minutes, I found that I was introduced to the directorate at the May 9, 1996 meeting. Since then I have continued to be involved with the trail, and served as vice-president in 1997, and since then, I have been

either president or vice-president to date. For those eighteen years, the trails have been well maintained by a large group of volunteers, important portions of the trail have been protected – such as the Temple Mountain State Reservation and the Wapack Wilderness, and a couple of parking lots created. Our financial strength has greatly improved, so I feel that it is time to step back and turn over the reins to someone else. All that we have been able to accomplish over these eighteen years has been a cooperative effort of all the officers and directors of the board, and the many, many volunteer members. 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Trail Work Days 2013

Report on our May 11 workday:

The Spring 2013 workday was held on May 11th, which was a somewhat wet workday. Even with less than ideal weather seven brave souls showed up. We drove to the summit of Pack Monadnock where we split into two groups. One to clear a blow down on the Raymond Trail ("just below the summit" Glenn Lloyd, the adopter of that trail, said) and the second group to start work on rehabilitating some water bars on the north slope of Pack. The blow down was a bit further and as luck would have it, fell on a steep section of the trail. After clearing that, we rejoined the other crew and started to work on rebuilding a number of water bars.

Luckily, the forecasted rain held off till noon, and we were able to build some pretty substantial water bars. When passing through on the End-to-End hike in September, we saw that they were holding up well and diverting water off the trail. They should last a long while.

By noon the rain began to pick up and the summit became socked in making the other planned project, clearing some views at the summit, pretty much impossible.

Report on our September 28 workday:

A total of four volunteers showed up under pretty much ideal weather conditions. In spite of the small crew we were able to accomplish most of what we wanted to along the re-routed section of the trail through Windblown. All of the work involved drainage improvements to minimize future impacts to the trail. By the end of the day we had installed three stone waterbars, five dips, and some extensive ditching. Thanks go out to Hiel Lindquist, Steve Dyke, Rick Blanchette, and Mike Przybyla.

Upcoming Workday:

Saturday October 26, 2013– Barrett and New Ipswich Mts.

The third workday of the 2013 season will be general maintenance on the Barrett Mountain-New Ipswich Mountain section. We'll be putting in some water bars, repainting blazes, and clearing brush in an area that was logged a few years back and is now growing in. We'll meet at 8:30 AM at Windblown and hike in. Check www.wapack.org for any last minute changes. Hope to see you there.

A reminder about Winter use of the Wapack Trail through Windblown Cross-Country Ski Area

- 1. With snow on the ground everyone using the Wapack Trail through Windblown property needs to pay for a trail ticket.
- 2. Everyone must use skis or snowshoes, no hiking.
- 3. In winter with a trail ticket you can use the Windblown parking lot during the day, not overnight.
- 4. Dogs are not permitted.
- 5. Check the Windblown website to see if they are open or stop into the ski shop between 9 and 5. If not open no trail fee.
- 6. Snowshoers need to stay out of the ski tracks.
- 7. People coming from south to north and not leaving a car in our lot can pay on their way out. Thank you!




