In Memoriam Ed Blanchette

Ed Blanchette, member and long time trail maintainer, passed away at his home in Greenville on March 30, 2017, at the age of 89. When his son Rick became Trails Committee Chairman in 1990, he joined the trail crew. Ed was a constant presence on work days for nearly two decades. On work days he would instruct new volunteers on trail maintenance best practices, including building and cleaning waterbars, clearing brush and blazing, working as hard as many half his age. He loved to work on his adopted trail section and helping many others with their sections, often doing the annual maintenance on his son's section on Pratt Mountain before his son could get to it. His trail section was the New Ipswich Mt. ridge which he maintained from his camp at Pratt Pond. He was very proud of the great condition of the trail. His favorite spot was the Binney Pond Outlook,

which he kept clear as you see it today. He also worked on trails with the Trailwrights, and was an active member of the Harris Center, attending many hikes and other events. (Continued on page 3)

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maintenance and preservation of the Wapack Trail System. 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Trail Work Days 2017



The Friends of the Wapack will be having three workdays this year. In large part due to the hard work of our Trail Adopters, the trail is in good condition so no major projects are planned.

These workdays will concentrate on regular trail maintenance focusing on drainage issues and

brush clearing. All workdays are on Saturdays and start at 8:30 AM. Tools are provided. Wear appropriate clothing and have work gloves and study shoes. Pack a lunch and bring plenty of water.

Saturday April 29 - Binney Hill Preserve

We will be working on the section of trail through the Binney Hill Preserve which was recently protected by the Northeast Wilderness Trust. We will be installing water bars, repairing vehicle caused trail damage, and improving drainage on the trail. In addition, we hope to assist staff from NWT with installation of property line markers around the perimeter of the property. We will meet at the Newest Mall on Routes124/123 in New Ipswich as there is limited parking on Binney Hill Road.

Saturday September 23 - Cliff Trail

We will be doing general maintenance and a small re-route on the Cliff Trail located in the Wapack National Wildlife Refuge. Meet at the Wapack National Wildlife Refuge trailhead parking lot on Mountain Road in Greenfield, NH

Saturday October 28th - Barrett Mountain

This day will focus on clean up and drainage work along the Wapack Trail on Barrett Mountain where a timber harvest has damaged the trail. We will also do some drainage work along the section between Barrett and New Ipswich Mountains. We will meet at the Windlblown Cross-Country Ski area lower parking lot on Routes 124/123 in New Ipswich, NH.

These workdays are a good opportunity to contribute in a direct way to the maintenance of the trail, learn some trail maintenance techniques, and have a good time. Hope to see you on a work day! -*Mike Przybyla, Trail Master*

Hiking the Wapack Trail through Windblown Cross-Country Ski Area

Hiking through Windblown Cross Country ski area is only allowed on the marked route of the Wapack Trail, and no mountain bikes please. Parking is still along the shoulder of Route 123/124 Turnpike Road, between Wapack Road and the Windblown entrance, not on Windblown property.

The trail is closed through Windblown during Mud Season—roughly now through early May. Thank you!

Hiking the Wapack Trail during Mud Season

With mud on the surface and frost still rising below, April/May mud season is the time when the Wapack Trail is most susceptible to damage from hikers boots. Please consider staying off the wettest areas until the ground thaws.



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

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In Memoriam Connie Hall

When Connie (Buck) Hall was a girl, she would visit her aunt Marion Davis at the Wapack Lodge and work with her, Frank Robbins, and other volunteers on the Wapack Trail. Marion and Frank were the founders of the trail. Connie passed away March 6, 2017.

Connie was our official Historian from our early years until 1996. During those years she wrote many articles for this newsletter featuring stories about the early days of the trail, and of her aunt Marion and Frank Robbins. These articles can still be viewed in our archive at the Peterborough Library.
